He describes how your mission support helps the synod equip and support lay leaders in their roles on church council, committees and other areas of congregational life:

The Saint Paul Area Synod supports lay leaders and various aspects of lay leadership in a number of ways. One of the main ways we do this is through our annual Tool Kit for Congregational Leaders, which focuses on equipping lay leaders for God's mission in their contexts. Around 240 leaders attended this event last month. There were nine fantastic workshops throughout the day...a wonderful lineup that encouraged, connected, and resourced leaders in congregations across the synod.

This fall, we will hold a six-part cohort series for presidents, vice presidents and other council members. Several former and current council leaders will join me in leading this series. It will be similar to the programming we offered in 2022-2023 with Dr. Dave Webb. Titled "Deeper Dive for Church Councils," the series will focus on many aspects of leading a church council and overall congregational leadership. I spend quite a bit of time walking with councils and executive teams as they seek to engage deeply in God's mission. We work together with the Holy Spirit to find the way forward!

percolating for using




technology in worship, for making their facility and culture more welcoming and for

The ever-increasing cries of Creation in crisis could easily overwhelm us. Instead let them serve as a clarion call to help bring life out of potential death, to help give renewed birth to all Creation, to all creatures including ourselves. This event is sponsored by the Northeastern Minnesota Synod, Northwest Synod of Wisconsin and our own Saint Paul



Area Synod's Care of Creation work group as well as other partner organizations.

The keynote speaker is author and theological ethicist Dr. Cynthia Moe-Lobeda. She lectures internationally on climate justice matters related to race and class, moral agency and hope, public church, ethical implications of resurrection and incarnation and faith-based resistance to systemic injustice. She is a professor at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary and found director of its Center for Climate Justice and Faith.

The summit features engaging sessions, worship, exhibits, networking opportunities, lunch and encouragement for our communities to give birth to strong, creative action. 


Cultivating Good Soil Through Prayer Ministry

Addressing Hunger:

Lent, Prayer and Advocacy

We are deep in the liturgical season of
Lent. It's our time as Christians to
reflect on the suffering of Jesus as he is
scorned, rejected, and finally
crucified. For many of us, this is a time
of more quiet, more introspection and more prayer.



I have joined in a Lectio Divina group for several Lenten seasons, which has provided me more time for a closer connection with God. Lent has also been a time when prayer seems to take the primary spot in my life while my advocacy concerns for those who hunger take a back seat. Why, I wonder? Why is not prayer a way to advocacy? Or, more importantly in my life as an advocate for people who live with hunger, why is not advocacy a prayer? Have you ever thought of it that way?

March is Minnesota's "Food Share" month and perhaps your congregation and local food shelf are asking for special donations of food and monies. This March is even more important as we need to keep the needs of those who hunger before our state and federal legislators. No matter how much we try, local efforts and food shelves cannot begin to fill the needs of those who hunger. Is advocacy not a way for me to pray?

Yes, we are once again deep in the liturgical season of Lent. Yes, our God continues to call us to advocate for those who have less, including those who live continually under the threat of not enough food and nutrition for their lives. But, also "yes," I ask you to consider your advocacy, which you certainly do prayerfully, as a Lenten prayer discipline. Prayer isn't only our quiet time; it's a call to action.

Draft Social Message on Child Protection

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), at least one in seven children has experienced abuse or neglect in the last year. A new draft social message from the ELCA addresses this crisis and outlines the church's sacred responsibility to protect and nurture children. The ELCA Church Council authorized the development of the social message, as requested by the 2022



Churchwide Assembly. (Our synod was one of several synods that brought forth memorials on the topic.)

You are invited to read a draft of this social message and provide feedback on it to help strengthen the final document. ELCA social messages are teaching documents that draw from existing social teaching but focus direct attention on a particular social issue. The public comment period is open through June 30. Read the draft and complete an online survey.

Mental Health Faith Forum

Saturday, May 3 - 9 a.m.-12:30 p.m. | Trinity, Stillwater

This event helps empower communities to support addiction and mental health recovery. You'll hear inspiring talks from



experts and advocates and updates from state policymakers, visit informative exhibits, and be part of the launch of a new *Our Stigma* podcast. The Mental Health Faith Forum features faith community leaders, Minnesota state policymakers and mental health/addiction experts sharing their expertise in an educational setting. The event includes cultural programming, speakers, and a large Q&A session. Indigenous, Hmong, East African, and African American presenters will all contribute to the discussion. The keynote speaker is social media influencer Kody Green, who has overcome challenges that include addiction, incarceration and serious mental health struggles. Registration is \$15 per person.
